Tournament director will combine tables as players are eliminated

All players will receive \$500 in chips

- Rebuy donation will be allowed in the first hour of the game only for players out of chips

Prizes awarded for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place

- 1st Place - \$500 Gift Card 2nd Place - \$200 Gift Card 3rd Place - \$100 Gift Card

Additional raffle prizes will be given out throughout the event

- Every person donating to the event will be rewarded with a raffle ticket(s)

Players will receive two drink tickets (beer or wine) and a food ticket

The Poker Tournament will begin at 6:00pm and the small and big blinds will increase every 30 minutes. The tournament director will announce when the small and big blinds have increased. The chart below provides the details on what they will be during the charity event.

- Rebuys are permitted the first hour of the game. Player will be eligible for rebuy in if the last hand was dealt prior to 7:00pm even if the end of the game finishes after the 1-hour deadline.
 - Player paying \$50 rebuy in will receive \$250 in chips
 - Only players out of chips can buy back in

Playing No Limits Texas Hold'em – Detailed Description

Texas Hold'em uses a dealer button to indicate the theoretical dealer. After each hand is complete, the button moves clockwise to the next active player. This player is referred to as "the button" and is "the dealer" for that hand.

The player to the left of the button is required to post the small blind. The small blind is equal to half the amount of the big blind.

****Please refer to the Charity Event Small and Big Blind Chart which outlines what the Small and Big Blinds will be during the event.**

The player to the left of the small blind is required to post the big blind. All blinds in Hold'em poker are considered live bets and players who post them have the option of checking, calling, raising or folding when the betting returns to their position.

After the blinds have been posted, two-hole cards are dealt to each active player, after which the first betting round begins with the player to the left of the big blind. There is no limit to the number, or quantity, of raises that a player may make in any round.

A player who does not have enough chips to call a bet is declared "All-In." That player is eligible for the portion of the pot to the point of his final wager, the "main pot." All further betting action involving other players takes place in a "side pot," which is unavailable to the player who has already gone All-In.

Charity Event Rules

- Seating arrangement will be determined in a random order
 - 5 tables of 10 players each
 - Tournament director will combine tables as players are eliminated
 - See below for additional details
- Minimum bet or raise is the big blind.
- If a misdeal occurs during the dealing of the whole cards, then the cards must be redealt.
- If a misdeal occurs when dealing the community cards, then the hand continues but the cards must be in the correct order. If the dealer forgets to burn a card, the correct card should be burned so the cards remain in the intended order.
 1. Small and big blinds are placed to the left of the dealer respectively.
 2. Each player is dealt two cards face down.
 3. A round of betting occurs.
 4. One card is placed face down “burned,” and three cards are placed face up in the middle of the table. This is called the “flop.” Your two down cards with the three cards on the Flop make up your 5-card hand.
 5. Another round of betting occurs.
 6. Another card is placed face down “burned,” and a fourth card is dealt face up. This is called the “Turn.” Now you have six cards with which to make your hand.
 7. A round of betting occurs.
 8. Another card is placed face down “burned,” and a fifth card is dealt face up. This is called the “River.” You use the five community cards along with your two private cards to make your best five card hand.
 9. A final round of betting occurs.
 10. After betting has been finalized the player with the best five card poker hand rakes the pot.

Seating Procedures

Seating procedures are as follows:

- Each poker table shall start with a maximum of 10 players.
- Player seats will be randomly assigned.
- A change of seat is not allowed after play starts, except as assigned by the Tournament Director between blind increases.
- When multiple tables are used for the poker event, the number of players at each table will be kept equal or as equal as possible.
- As players are eliminated, randomly assign the remaining players to empty seats at other tables, keeping tables reasonably balanced.
- If a player is required to move to balance the tables, it will be done in a manner that is fair to all players according to position of the blinds (i.e. if a player who is due to play the big blind is moved, they should be positioned as close in sequence as possible to play the big blind in the new location).
- The number of players at each table will be kept reasonably balanced by the transfer of a player as needed. When more than six tables are in play, table size will be kept equal within two players. When six tables or fewer are in play, table size will be kept equal within one player.

5. Dealing and Betting Procedures Dealing and betting procedures are as follows:

- At the start of the tournament, the Dealer at each table must open a new standard deck of 52 cards in full view of all the players.
- The cards shall be checked by the players to ensure a full complement of cards.
- The cards shall be washed face down and shuffled.
- Any deck suspected of, or containing, marked, damaged or suspect cards must be replaced, and any suspected marked decks must be provided with the event incident report. Deck changes will be determined by the Tournament Director.
- The active player to the right of the dealer (i.e., seat 10) shall start the game with the button.



Hand Rankings



1. Royal Flush (Ace, King, Queen, Jack, 10, all the same suit)
2. Straight Flush (five cards in order, all the same suit)
3. Four of a Kind (four cards of the same rank)
4. Full House (three of a kind and a pair)
5. Flush (five cards of the same suit)
6. Straight (five cards in rank order)
7. Three of a Kind (three cards of the same rank)
8. Two Pair (two distinct pairs of cards and a fifth card)
9. One Pair (one pair with three distinct cards)
10. High Card (highest ranked card)
